

ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTIONS

Rectangle Flag

Assembly Checklist & Instructions

ENSURE YOU HAVE ALL PARTS

- 1 x Bag
- 1 x Straight Pole Set (varying lengths)
- 1 x Fabric Flag
- 1 x Ground Spike (or other base option)

FOLLOW ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTIONS BELOW

Estimated time: 5 minutes



STEP 1

Take each of the poles out of the bag. Each pole is designed to fit into one another. The largest with a tie clip being at the bottom and the smallest and most flexible being at the top



STEP 2

Once you have your poles assembled, take your fabric flag and find the hole at the bottom of the flag (Where the tie down is). Take the ball end of the pole set and start sliding your flag through. Once all through, take your elastic tie down and start sliding your flag through. Once all through, take your elastic tie down and tie it to the clip at the bottom of the pole



STEP 3

Now that you have your poles and fabric flag assembled, you are ready to mount your flag onto your chosen base. Simply slide your bottom flag pole onto the base fitting and your flag is ready!



CONGRATULATIONS

Your flag is ready to go!

CARING FOR YOUR RECTANGLE FLAGS

CLEANING - If your rectangle flag is starting to get dusty or dirty, you can wash it by putting it in the washing machine on a cold wash with half the detergent you would normally use and some fabric softener. Do not tumble dry, simply hang it up on the clothes line and wait for it to be completely dry before packing it up to avoid any mildew or damage.

MAINTENANCE - Flags are generally subjected to the environment and its elements. Ultraviolet rays and high winds cause the breakdown of the fibres in the flags, particularly the sewn edges at the extremities. The pigment in the inks used also tend to breakdown, making your flags fade over time. A flag in extreme conditions will not last as long as a flag flown in tempered environments. If you wish to preserve your flag, it should be brought in when strong winds are predicted. The life of a flag also depends on its flying time. A flag that is used 24 hours a day will definitely not last as long as a flag that is used casually! Flags in general can be expected to last between 6 to 12 months.
